# Methodology



## **Overview**

Conway Regional Health System conducted our 2025 Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) to better understand the evolving health priorities of the communities we serve and to guide our strategic initiatives aimed at improving community health. This assessment fulfills federal and state requirements while reinforcing our mission to provide high-quality, compassionate care and promote the overall well-being of our region.

## **Process & Methodology**

The CHNA process was collaborative and data-driven, incorporating both quantitative and qualitative sources to ensure a thorough understanding of local health trends and community perspectives.

We gathered data from multiple sources, including county-level public health data, internal hospital and clinical metrics, community surveys, employee surveys, stakeholder input, and focus groups with both internal and external community members. This blended approach provided meaningful insight into community health needs and perceptions.

## **Next Steps**

We will use the findings from this CHNA to inform our 2025 – 2027 strategic plan, outlining measurable goals and targeted initiatives to address each identified priority. We remain committed to collaborating with local partners to advance community health outcomes and monitor progress toward reducing disparities across our service area.

# Review of the 2022 CHNA



Since completing our 2022 Community Health Needs Assessment, we have made measurable progress across nearly every identified priority area. Through expanded services, strengthened community partnerships, and a continued focus on accessibility, we have advanced community health and improved access to essential resources throughout our service area.

## **Obesity & Nutrition:**

Obesity management services expanded through increased bariatric engagement, strengthened referrals for medical nutrition therapy, and growth in medical fitness programming with additional tracks and nutrition-focused offerings. These efforts increased access to weight-management resources and supported healthier lifestyles across the community.

## **Access to Care:**

Access improved through expanded telehealth services, deployment of the Mobile Health Unit to extend outreach into underserved areas, and broader use of remote patient monitoring. The Patient Navigation Center increased in visibility and impact. Ongoing provider recruitment and expansion of Graduate Medical Education programs further strengthened long-term access to care within the service area.

## **Substance Abuse:**

Access to tobacco cessation services increased, alongside expanded public education on the risks associated with tobacco use. These initiatives strengthened prevention efforts and supported greater treatment engagement.

## **Chronic Disease Management:**

Preventive screenings and chronic disease programs expanded, including increased participation in diabetes self-management education and enhanced medical fitness programming for individuals with diabetes and heart disease. Community health education initiatives further strengthened awareness of prevention and early intervention strategies.

# Faulkner County Key Findings

## Chronic Disease Management

Conditions such as diabetes, hypertension, and cardiovascular disease remain prevalent in the community, underscoring the importance of ongoing education, preventive screenings, and coordinated care management.

## Maternal and Fetal Health

Decline in the number of delivering hospitals and providers creates an urgent need to prioritize maternal health services.
